Is this fair and do its writers care as long as they sell well? A former journalist, **Craig Robertson** had a 20-year career with a Scottish Sunday newspaper before becoming a full-time author. His gritty crime novels are set on the mean streets of contemporary Glasgow. His first novel, *Random*, was shortlisted for the 2010 CWA New Blood Dagger and was long listed for the 2011 Crime Novel of the Year.
